Don't be deceived by the fact that "service" is the last of three items listed in Wheaton Academy's mission statement as tools for nurturing growth in our students. It is last, but certainly not least.

Our missionary map (wheatonacademy.org/maps/map.html) and past Alumni of the Year (like Compassion International President and CEO Wess Stafford) are testaments to the fact that Christian service has been an important part of a Wheaton Academy education for decades. Within our current student body, this tradition is growing and expanding each year.

The Zambia Project: A Catalyst for Renewed Fervor

In 2002, a core group of WA students participating in a leadership team felt a prompting from Jesus to launch what has become known as "the Zambia Project." According to Dean of Spiritual Life Chip Huber, this student dream helped to transform hundreds of student lives and helped to reshape the culture and mindset of the student body as they began to respond in creative ways to the needs of the poor and sick in sub-Saharan Africa.

Over the next six years, WA students raised a remarkable \$620,000 to support the small Zambian community of Kakolo Village. Their efforts funded the building of a medical clinic, a schoolhouse, wells for clean drinking water, food security programs, and a facility to house local Good News Clubs. These buildings and programs helped to stem the growing tide of devastation that AIDS has caused in that region of the world. Our students' dedication led World Vision Vice

President Steve Haas to note that he knew of no other activity on any Christian campus, high school or college, that was having a global impact like WA's student-led Zambia Project.

But equally important was the impact this service initiative had on our student body and their growth in their relationships with Jesus Christ. Over 100 students joined Chip and other faculty to see first-hand the needs WA was addressing in Kakolo Village, and the life change that these experiences wrought in these students and their peers was palpable. "Life is about way more than just me and my own world," or "God's Kingdom work is so much bigger and exciting than I ever imagined," are ideas commonly heard from students as a result of entering into relationship with the people of Zambia.

Overseas Efforts Continue

Although the Zambia Project officially came to a close in 2008 when World Vision announced Wheaton Academy students had

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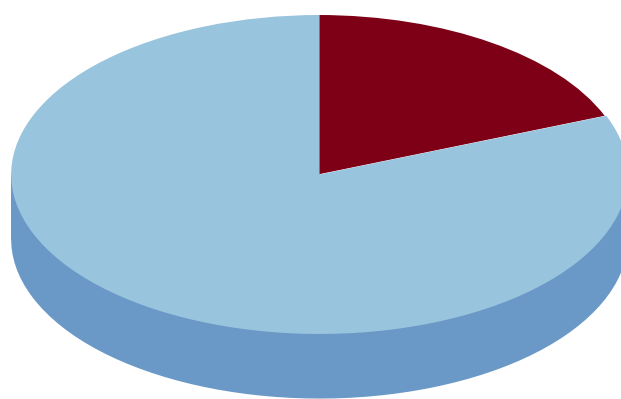

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helped in accomplishing all the community development model objectives originally set out for Kakolo Village, the fire for service and the learning that it brings continues to burn.

During the 2008-2009 school year, our students launched a new partnership with World Bicycle Relief, an organization providing this simple yet crucial form of transportation to African students so that they can attend high school. They've also partnered with Opportunity International to offer micro-loans for business start-ups and long-term growth in Kenya. Their efforts in these and other areas have been so exemplary that local businesses, including Starbucks and an area salon, have begun proactively seeking ways to partner with our students in their outreach initiatives.

These efforts take place alongside other WA programs that have had sustained impact through the years. Winterim student teams have traveled to Guatemala, Honduras, Costa Rica and the Dominican Republic, partnering with local churches and missionaries to meet the needs of impoverished families and orphan children through work projects and Bible Clubs. These efforts help to transform many student lives as they spend two weeks in January partnering with God in His global work.

Local Initiatives Blossom

Another wonderful outgrowth of a student body inspired to serve others is an interest in ministering to those near as well as far. Spanish and Bible teacher Kim Malmquist heads a team of students partnering with area churches and ministries in a program called Puente del Pueblo, or Bridge of the People. They run an after-school children's program that meets in the largest apartment complex in nearby, and largely Hispanic, West Chicago.

"We're called to be neighbors to those in our own backyard. God has opened the doors for us to build an ongoing relationship with children in our community," Kim says. The goal is to meet basic needs, like homework and English language help, and provide friendship. This creates opportunities to evangelize.

Kim is not the only WA teacher involved. Business teacher Scott Marksberry helps coach soccer, and instrumental music teacher Steve Willemsen and his wife lead a music program with Puente del Pueblo.

Sophomore Lindsay Myra tutors third through sixth graders once a week. Sometimes she just hangs out and gets to know them. "Some come from broken families, and I want to show them love by spending time with them," says Lindsay.

In the same vein as overseas efforts, these programs don't just impact our surrounding community. Our students' lives are changed, and their eyes are opened as they witness God's work among the nations – around the globe and around the block.

A Heritage of Service Continues

God has done amazing work through Wheaton Academy students and their service initiatives over the last decade. This thrilling trend is certainly not new, as seen in our school's rich heritage of missionaries and Christian servants. It is, however, a testimony to God's enduring faithfulness to our school. He continues to work at Wheaton Academy and to allow our students the privilege of serving others for His glory. For this, we are grateful and excitedly anticipating the years to come as He continues to unfold new opportunities for service and growth within our student body.

Wheaton Academy Wins Fifth Place at Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering State Finals



At the 2008-2009 Worldwide Youth in Science and Engineering (WYSE) state finals, the Warriors earned fifth place among schools with enrollments between 301-700 students. Individual place winners were **Ian Moses** (sixth in state chemistry), **Josh Ellis** (fifth in state physics), **Susie Lee** (fifth in state math), and **David Kelley** (fourth in state chemistry). David Kelley and Ian Moses combined in chemistry to have a perfect 100 in that event, edging out University of Chicago Lab Schools, and keeping them from a perfect team score of 500! In addition to

our chemistry scoring, **Rebekah Delicath** and **Kayla Lindstedt** led our team in English scoring, **Susie Lee** and **Josh Ellis** in math, **Dylan Mooney, Stephanie Pearson** and **Kayla Lindstedt** in biology, and **Josh Ellis, Joshua Rak** and **Jake Jones** in physics.

Coached by biology teacher **Ken Ellis** (pictured at left), they are sure to learn the fundamentals and thrill of competitive wrestling. An exciting season is in front of them.

While not yet fielding a fall schedule, Ken expects the Warriors will head to several tournaments this year.

Ken's connection to the WA wrestling program stems back to when he coached from 1979-1990. He himself competed on a solid high school team near Detroit, MI. While a student at Madison High School, he was coached by the colorful and legendary professional wrestler, Jim Meyers, better known to fans during the 1970s and 1980s as George "The Animal" Steele. Ken's own anticipation about the wrestling program is evident in his huge smile.

Wheaton Academy Athletic Director Paul Ferguson says, "Wrestling is very challenging, physically demanding, and will give some of our young men who aren't on the basketball team a chance to compete in a winter sport."

Wrestling at Wheaton Academy has had a major impact through the life of former coach Tom Jarman. After coaching here, he coached at Taylor University in Upland, IN, and later, at Northwestern University in Evanston, IL.

Jack teaches Digital Photography, Graphic Design, and Painting at Wheaton Academy and is known by his colleagues as a creative, godly teacher. He wears many hats, including ad hoc artist at WA, called upon for his professional assistance in everything from branding to website layout. His Winterim course for set design brings students together who want to learn the art and craft of theater stage design, skills used in Wheaton Academy's musical.

Books about art, design, education and collaboration fill Jack Burgess' classroom. Student art and photography cover the walls. Piled in corners and leaning against his desk are a banjo, juggling pins, and a balancing device which looks like a cross between a skateboard and a see-saw. There is purpose to all of this, says Jack, "It's about creating a creative space, where inspiration is always just a few feet away, where risk taking is encouraged."

The consummate multitasking teacher, he assisted one student in a complex printing issue, solved another student's camera problem, and offered ideas for a third student's artwork – all while participating in our interview.

Becoming an Artist

His high school didn't have an art program. It wasn't until his sophomore year at college that Jack realized that he was an artist. Through the influence of friends, including *New Yorker* cartoonist Matt Diffee, Jack switched his major from Accounting to Graphic Design after his freshman year, and then to Studio Art with a concentration in Drawing and Painting his sophomore year. "My parents were amazing. Neither of them went to college but they did everything they could to ensure that I did. They paid for my education, making sacrifices to afford the tuition. They supported me as I worked my way through three different majors."

"I had a late start as an artist... I had quite a bit of catching up to do. For three years, I spent every day in the studio, doing the work of an artist, developing my style, really learning how to paint," Jack said with remnants of his Lexington, Kentucky accent slipping through. He spent the early part of his career capturing Kentucky's natural beauty on canvas.

After college Jack worked as a painter and began showing his work at Mary Praytor Gallery in Greenville, South Carolina. He spent three years painting in Kentucky, Scotland, and South Carolina, helping him see a large range of God's handiwork.

Before arriving at Wheaton Academy in 2003, Jack taught art and coached basketball at Dublin Christian Academy in Dublin, New Hampshire. He found success as a basketball coach, as well as in the classroom. "We took the state championship," he smiled. After five years at Dublin Christian Academy, Jack moved on to work as a designer for Ernst & Young in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

A Designer in the Corporate World

Jack considers his experience at Ernst & Young to be the most formative of his life. "I worked as an artist and designer in a place that was set up for collaborative work. I learned how to work on a team, the value an artist brings to the thinking process, and how to enable large groups of people to work together to discover answers to their businesses' most complex questions." It was also the first time that he was in an environment in which he was the only Christian.

"I grew up in a really conservative environment, and I think I was really afraid to step out into the world. I realized that I could function and thrive in a secular environment. My faith wasn't threatened like I had been told it would be. To the contrary, it grew. It also gave me tremendous confidence in the value of the artistic perspective. Our clients came to us with issues that they couldn't resolve on their own. I realized that problems get solved when someone gets creative."

Gaining a Vision for Teaching

Jack also gained a vision for teaching that was really different than any he had experienced before. "We would work 16-hour days and still be completely energized. I realized that we all love to learn, and that when it happens the right way it creates energy instead of draining it." Jack brings that energy to Wheaton Academy, and he sees Wheaton Academy as a place where he can merge all the things he loves: art, faith, and teaching.

Jack knows that the vast majority of his students aren't going to go on to be photographers or designers. He strives to convey to them the importance of the examined life. "He is always talking about the difference between looking and seeing," senior Harrison Cowell said.

"He cares about our opinions," Harrison said, "He respects us. His assignments help us to grow spiritually and artistically."

Dozens of other students could echo Harrison's words. Jack's impact on their lives, artistically and spiritually, is deep. He is a creative example of what it means to be a living curriculum teacher.



Into the Woods

Scenes from the 2009 Spring Musical Bring in Biblical Values and Fairy Tale Charm

For five nights in late February and early March, the Wheaton Academy community was thrilled and challenged by the richly textured Stephen Sondheim musical *Into the Woods*.

Hard questions about living in a challenging world were asked through the lives of colorful characters we know from stories we heard growing up.

Drawing from the children's stories *Little Red Ridinghood*, *Jack and the Beanstalk*, *Rapunzel*, and *Cinderella*, the musical presented the questions, "What is responsibility?" and "How do we deal with the giants in our lives?"

Over 3,000 people attended the musical. The show included 70 people in the cast, 21 people in the pit orchestra, and 140 people in the production staff and crews.

On the morning of opening night, Corbett Burick, the director of the Fine Arts department and the musical, gave birth to her son Syrus. Corbett made a surprise appearance in the closing night show to the joyous roar of the audience.

Life was very different in 1951 when Carolyn Stevenson graduated from Wheaton Academy. She remembers taking a train to the Academy, where there were fewer students, and the art program was just a class or two.

Carolyn found her way back here after college, teaching general art but also working in specialty areas including ceramics, fiber arts, and stained glass.

Relationships have always been a core part of her teaching as she wants to inspire and disciple as well as teach art. About young artists, Carolyn said, "God gives the talents and the passions. They should use the gifts God gave them... high school is where they can try different art forms."

Among her favorite memories was a WA-sponsored trip to Italy, where her students sketched, painted and photographed in the land of some of history's greatest artists.

What Now?

"WA has a wonderful heritage, and I feel privileged God has allowed me to have had a small part in it," she said. As she retires, she leaves big shoes to fill. She is excited to keep her relationship with Wheaton Academy by continuing to help with the spring musical and attending events.

Since 1982, Barbara has brought her love of God, language and books to Wheaton Academy. She taught composition, literature and classical mythology before taking on the leadership of the Library in 1990.
